Maths:

Over the half-term, we will be returning to some of the key mathematical concepts that we have already looked at in order to develop our understanding of these further.


We will begin by learning more about the place value of numbers; including looking at negative numbers and Roman numerals.

Following this, we will look at the four calculations. We will become more fluent in using efficient methods to find the answers to questions in addition to solving problems rooted in these areas.

Finally, we will remind ourselves of fractions, decimals and percentages, having a greater focus on equivalence and finding fractions and percentages of amounts.

English:

This half-term, we are continuing to develop our understanding of our topics with literary texts which are based around these.



Following this, we will write biographies about Nelson Manela, after reading his book *Long Walk to Freedom* as well as reading extracts from *My Story: Slave Girl* (Patricia C. McKissack). We will use this to explore how the diaries are written before writing our own.

Thursday – PE today. Children should wear PE kits today please.




This half-term, our topic is Journey from America

On 12th October 1492, Italian explorer, Christopher Columbus arrived in the Americas and introduced it to the rest of the world.
