Safeguarding This Month's Focus

Staying Safe Online – Together

As children grow, technology becomes a bigger part of their world — from games and videos to chatting with friends. While the internet offers great opportunities for learning and fun, it's important that children understand how to use it safely and responsibly.

Top Tips for Parents

1. Talk Early, Talk Often

Start conversations about online safety from an early age. Ask what your child enjoys doing online, who they talk to, and how they feel about what they see. Keep it calm and open — children are more likely to share worries if they know they won't get into trouble.

2. Set Boundaries Together

Agree on clear rules for screen time, age-appropriate apps, and online behaviour. Revisit these regularly as your child grows.

3. Use Parental Controls

Free tools like **Google Family Link**, **Apple Screen Time**, and **YouTube Kids settings** help you manage what your child can see and do online.

4. Keep Devices in Shared Spaces

Encourage online use in communal areas — such as the living room — so you can keep an eye on what's happening.

5. Model Good Behaviour

Children learn from what they see! Show how to take breaks, be kind online, and think before posting.

Gaming & Social Media

- Many popular games and apps (like Roblox, Fortnite, TikTok, and Snapchat) have age limits of 13+.
- For younger children, stick to child-friendly platforms like YouTube Kids, BBC iPlayer Kids, or Nintendo games with parental filters.
- Always check game chat functions disable voice or text chat for younger players.

What to Watch For

- Sudden changes in behaviour after being online.
- Secrecy around phone or tablet use.
- Upset or withdrawn behaviour after gaming or messaging.

If you're concerned, talk with your child calmly and contact your teacher or Mrs Human for advice and support.

Remember

Online safety isn't about removing risk completely — it's about **teaching children to manage it safely** with our support and guidance.

Let's work together to keep every child safe, smart, and kind online.

SEND Spotlight on...

receptive language

Last time, our spotlight was on producing speech sounds (see the Newsletters section of our website for details).



This month we focus on the second main speech & language area that we assess - receptive language.

Receptive language is what we understand. It relates to these areas:

- ⇒ Morphology (how the order of letters affects the meaning of the word)
- ⇒ Phonology (speech sounds)
- ⇒ Pragmatics (the meaning/feeling expressed by the spoken word)
- ⇒ Semantics (vocabulary)
- ⇒ Syntax (the order of words)

Processing all of these together is vital for children to be able to:

- ⇒ Focus on the person speaking
- ⇒ Understand what is being said or done
- ⇒ Understand and follow routines
- ⇒ Take turns
- ⇒ Remember familiar names/facts

We assess receptive (and expressive) language using <u>BPVS</u>, <u>WellComm</u> (and sometimes the <u>Bedfordshire Understanding of Language Toolkit</u>). These identify children who need more support. They may also recommend that we refer a child to the NHS for speech & language therapy.

How can you help?


- Daily reading (both you and the child) and talking about the meaning of the words/book
- Commenting on what the child (and others) are doing and why
- Modelling good listening, with eye contact and not speaking over others
- Playing Simon Says (or other instruction games)
- Build up the number of parts to instructions

Eg Sit down à Sit down on the chair à Sit down on the brown chair à Sit down on the brown chair by the window

- Using Makaton signs together with words (children learn many of these in Early Years)
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- Asking Blank's level questions about books/the world around you




Yr 5&6 Football Tournament

Absence

The academy attendance policy is available on website https://beckrow.attrust.org.uk/ under Our Academy and the Policies tab.

It can be tricky deciding whether to keep your child off school when they're unwell. Please always ensure that you telephone the office before 9.30am on the morning of any absence. If your child is absent for 5 days or more, you will be asked to provide medical evidence in line with our attendance policy.

What is an authorised absence?

Pupil illness - absences are authorised in line with the academy attendance policy, following guidance from the UK Health Security Agency (<u>UK Health Security Agency</u>) **or** where there is medical evidence provided.

Mild ailments such as headaches, tummy aches or colds will not be authorised.

Emergency medical appointments, where evidence is provided. Routine appointments should be made outside of school hours.

Other exceptional circumstances, where a Leave of Absence form has been completed in advance and at the Principal's discretion.

What is an unauthorised absence?

- Holidays during term time
- Mild illnesses
- Shopping trips or days off for birthdays
- Illness of a parent or other family member
- No transport

If you need any support with your child's attendance or punctuality, please get in contact with a member of the Pastoral or Senior Leadership Team.

Uniform reminder

It is our school policy that all children wear school uniform when attending school, representing the school, or when participating in a school-organised event outside normal school hours, unless the activity involves wearing specific clothing for health and safety reasons.

The School uniform consist of a royal blue sweatshirt or cardigan, a white polo or shirt, grey trousers or skirt, and black shoes.

For PE, pupils need plain black shorts or joggers, a royal blue t-shirt and black trainers.

Only small stud earrings and religious items are allowed and must be removed for PE, with no makeup, nail polish, or extreme hairstyles. Long hair must also be tied back.

Please make sure everything is clearly named.
